Notes on the program

Concert Strings, Symphonic Strings & Chamber Orchestra

Concerto in D minor for Two Violins (c. 1720)

J. S. Bach

Between 1717 and 1723, Bach was employed by Prince Leopold of Anhalt-Cöthen, a music-loving nobleman from an area northeast of Weimar in what used to be called East Germany. The position was rather similar to the one that Haydn was to hold with the Esterházy family later on in the century. When Bach was engaged as Kapellmeister, Leopold's court boasted one of the largest and finest orchestras in Europe. (Orchestras of that day rarely numbered more than 12 musicians.) Bach composed a considerable amount of instrumental music for the Cöthen musicians, including most of his solo concertos. Bach was very interested in the Italian style of concerto writing, particularly the works of Antonio Vivaldi. He studied Vivaldi's music avidly, sometimes copying the scores to develop greater familiarity with the style. It is no surprise that the D Minor Concerto for two violins reflects certain Italian Baroque characteristics. ~Program notes Laurie Schulman ©2012

Overture to Lucio Silla, K. 135 (1772)

W.A. Mozart, Arr. Dackow

An "Overture" is a musical introduction to an opera. The musical themes from the opera are condensed and presented without singing. The opera Lucio Silla is about a Roman dictator, unrequited love, and betrayal. Written when Wolfgang Amadeus was only 16 years old, premiered in 1772, this work has given Concert Orchestra not only an oppotunity to get to know about the opera art form but also the quintessential style of Mozart's compositions. We listened to lots of different bits of opera stories, clips from Amadeus (the Oscar winning movie about Mozart), and other pieces by Mozart, including the famous "Eine Kleine Nachtmusik).

Arlington Sketches (1994)

Arlington Sketches is an exciting and rhythmic piece that features a slow middle section where musicians place a "mute" upon the bridge to soften their instrument's projection and mute the timbre. Concert Orchestra and Symphonic Strings students are sitting side-by-side in an effort to enjoy making music with students in all grades at Waubonsie. Collaborations of this type remind us that music is truly a universal language, inviting common experiences and collaborative mindset.

Miniature Quartet No. 2 (1955)

David Stone

English composer David Stone, who died aged 94, was for 12 years director of music at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama (RSAMD) in Glasgow, now the Royal Scottish Conservatoire. A gifted classical musician, composer and conductor, he became best-known as a music educator, writing string quartets and other short pieces for schoolchildren and young amateur orchestras – now performed all over the world.

A pianist and violinist himself, Mr Stone decided early in his career that teaching music to children and young people – so that they would play it rather than just listen to it – was his vocation.

Perhaps his most famous works are his four Miniature String Quartets (Numbers 1-4), which you may still hear played to this day by enthusiastic schoolchildren or young orchestras from Jerusalem to Japan. The three-movement quartets have been described as "fragrant, redolent of the English countryside, the first String quartets of at least two generations of string players." ~Program notes from the composer's obituary

Written in commoration of the American String Teachers Association's 25th anniversary, this 3 movement piece explores dynamic contrasts, rhythmic intesity and beautiful melodies.

Suite for Strings (1973), A-Rovin'

John Rutter

John Rutter is an English composer, still alive, known mostly for his choral music, both sacred and secular, and he writes in a rich style similar to many well loved British composers including Benjamin Britten and Ralph Vaughan Williams. This Suite for Strings includes orchestral settings of British folk tunes. We will be playing the first movement titled A-Rovin', which is a sea shanty. Sea Shanty's (like "Popeye the Sailor Man" and "Druken Sailor") were famously sung in the British Isles as sailors would labor aboard their ships and usually had to do with womanizing, drinking, and general shinanigans sailors would partake in when 'at port'. Concert Strings listened to some versions of A-Rovin' that we found on YouTube in order to prepare for this piece. We also listened to the other movements to more fully understand the composer's intent for this piece.

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Notes on the Program

Concert Strings

Fugue in g minor "Little" (c. 1703)

J.S. Bach, arr. Howard

What is Fugue? This is a question that Concert Strings has been answering as we have been learning this famous fugue by Johann Sebastian Bach. A fugue presents a theme, called the 'subject', that is repeated in different lines, creating a tapestry of interwoven parts. Brilliant in its composition, this fugue was written for 1 person to play on an organ - one, two or three of the lines played by 2 hands and the bottom line played by the feet on the bottom keyboard of the organ. In order to learn more about fugue themes/subjects, students in Concert Strings researched their favorite arrangement of this piece on YouTube (there are SO MANY!) and then created a video that showed off the fugue themes in pictures.

Chamber Orchestra

Concerto Grosso for String Orchestra (1950) Ralph Vaughan Williams

Vaughan Williams came from a prestigious line of English families, particularly on his mother's side. Margaret Vaughan Williams' maiden name was Wedgwood. She was the daughter of Josiah Wedgwood III, grandson of the famous English potter Josiah Wedgwood, and Caroline Darwin, older sister of Charles. Unlike some young composers who were pressured to go into the family profession (in this case, law), Ralph was encouraged to indulge in his love for music. He studied piano, organ, violin, and viola, but it became increasingly clear that what he liked to do was compose. In addition to his prolific life as a composer, Vaughan Williams was also an enthusiastic educator. The Concerto Grosso was written for the Rural Schools Music Association, and was premiered in 1950. In this work, the ensemble is divided into sections playing at varying difficulty levels that are integrated within the traditional concerto grosso structure of a smaller group called the "concertino" performing against the backdrop of the whole ensemble called the "ripieno" or in this case, "tutti." Vaughan Williams pairs the "advanced" music with the concertino, the "intermediate" with the tutti and adds another grouping, "ad lib," for the "novice." ~ Program notes from A Far Cry

The District 204 Solo & Ensemble Festival is held annually at Waubonsie Valley High School and is a volunteer co-curricular event featuring solo events, usually with a piano accompanist, and chamber ensembles from all three district high schools. WV students work with Mr. Burck and Ms. Silberman as well as their private teachers if they take lessons. On the day of the event (February 23) they attend a 1 hour clinic where they not only play and receive feedback from a clinician but also observe others playing and attend an evening Honors recital featuring the very best musicians in our district. WV Tri-M students set up and tear down the rooms as well as help all day during the festival.

This year Waubonsie orchestra had 89 total events: 30 violin solos, 11 viola solos, 15 cello solos, 3 bass solos, 3 pianists, and 27 ensembles!
